

1984 is Happening Now – Part Five

A few weeks ago, the Senators in the District of Criminals voted on a National Identification Card, which is also known as your driver's license.

The globalist handpuppets passed it 100-0.

Welcome to the world, folks, of *Show-me-your-papers*.

Now what's really interesting is that nearly all of us never even knew the legislation was on The Hill, right?

And why was that?

Because the mainstream networks and news agencies—that *free* press owned by corporate and foundation money—wouldn't tell you, couldn't tell you, because they're not allowed to tell you.

But it gets worse.

Any of you who renewed your Florida driver's license since late 2004 must have read in the accompanying literature that your new license *was* a National ID card.

In today's electronic world, our greatest threat is, not being a victim of synthetic terror, but the chance our identities will be pirated through the ever-burgeoning number of data bases now compiling information about U.S. citizens from the time they leave their mothers' wombs.

This National ID card will bear three photos of you, one of which is called a ghost image and is barely perceivable to the naked eye. Hidden beneath your ghost image is what the *St. Petersburg Times* called "secret data" in a front page story a few weeks ago. The data is so secret that even we don't know what it contains, yet we have to carry this information around with us for the rest of our lives.

Why the need for secret information about us; secret information that is being kept from us; but secret information we are *forced* to keep with us?

What's with all the secrecy?

In defense of this secret data being incorporated into our National ID cards, some of the drooling masses might regurgitate that same old brainless dictum: "If you've got nothing to hide, you've got nothing to fear."

While you're out driving one night, maybe you're deep in thought and let your vehicle's wheels touch upon the yellow highway dividing line. It was just for a moment, then you snapped back to give your full attention to driving.

The cop that happens to be behind you wonders if you might be a DUI and pulls you over.

He runs your National ID Card through his computer, and the "secret data" yields your health problems and medications.

Not the cop, you understand, but the computer mandates that you may be an *at-risk* driver, and the cop is advised to remove you from behind the wheel.

If that sounds like a stretch, be aware that there was a bill in the New Jersey legislature that called for attempted murder charges to be laid against drivers who were stopped and retina scanned and found to be driving while sleep deprived.

Ever get an early start on a trip, perhaps leave at 4 AM, and not be at your best?

Well, if stopped in those wee small hours of the morning, that less-than-completely-alert state could make you a big-time felon.

Ain't that a bit scary?

Yes, it is.

But, for now, the fate of that legislation seems to have lost steam. However, expect it to rear its head again in the not-all-too-distant future.

The bottom line, though, about our National ID Card, regardless what information can be accessed from the "secret data" section, is this: the card is tantamount to an internal passport and reeks of Nazi Germany and Communist Russia.

And speaking of such fascist-like behavior seeping into our government, take note of what Al Martin wrote regarding the National ID Card.

Who is Martin?
